Visio Divina Prayer

Visio Divina is Latin for "sacred seeing." This practice invites us to meditate on God's word through artistic depictions of it. At this station, you'll find pieces of art that span place and time, and the reflection questions below, which prompt us to wonder how God might be speaking through the artistic expressions of the biblical story.

Look at the piece on screen—the shapes, the colors, the lines, the textures. Look at the facial expressions and postures of the people. Prayerfully reflect:

- What catches your eye? Why might you be drawn to this?
- What, if anything, surprises about the piece?
- What aspects of the call story are most prominently depicted?
- What emotions or reactions does the image evoke in you? Why?
- What might the Holy Spirit be communicating to you through this piece?

After reflecting on the image, you may conclude with a prayer, thanking God for God's presence, and for artists who help make it come alive in the world.

Lectio Divina Prayer

A prayer practice that's been used across Christian traditions for centuries. It invites us to listen for God's voice through repetitively reading and praying through scripture. Before jumping in, begin with a moment of silence to still your heart and mind, asking God to be present in your prayerful listening. Then, follow the steps below:

Lectio (READ)

Using the text printed in your bulletin, slowly read through today's text again.

Meditatio (REFLECT)

In the second reading of your passage, listen for a particular word, phrase, or image that jumps out at you. Meditate silently on it for a few moments. Reflect on why your attention might have been drawn to this particular word, phrase, or image. What might God be saying through it? Try to listen to how God might be speaking.

Oratio (RESPOND)

In your third prayerful reading of the passage, listen for God's invitation. How might God be inviting you to respond through this word/phrase/image? What is God calling you to?

Contemplatio (REST)

The focus of the fourth prayerful reading of the passage is to simply rest in God's presence. There is no further need to reflect or respond--simply dwell in the love, grace, and peace of Christ.
