EMMANUEL IS ALL AROUND US

Mennonite pastor Isaac Villegas writes that "Advent is a celebration of the incarnation, of God who became human flesh in Jesus Christ. The advent of Jesus, the accounts of his birth and life and death — all are glimpses of God, announcements of what God's presence looks like in the world and in our lives." Therefore, during the season of Advent, we are invited to look for such "announcements" God's presence in the world and in our lives. As we await God's incarnate coming, we are invited to explore the ways that Emmanuel (God With Us) dwells among us here and now, in ways that are ordinary, surprising--and surprisingly ordinary! Where might we glimpse Emmanuel in the world and in our lives? Scripture gives us some clues. As you know, the Bible is full of different names, metaphors, and images of God. Some we likely already know: king, shepherd, father, bread. Others, though, are perhaps less familiar: hen, shade, thunder, gardener, midwife. These are not names for God that we typically use in our worship life or our prayer lives...but they're deeply biblical! They remind us that God

Here at Cross of Glory, we have explored scriptural images of God for the past couple years during Advent. In 2020, we looked at God the potter, God the quilter, and God the shepherd. In 2021, we focused on God as clothing, migrant, composer, and mother. This year, we will explore three new scriptural images of God: teacher, darkness, and hen.

comes to us in ways that are both familiar and in ways that might

seem strange or surprising—in ways, as Craddock notes in the quote

on the cover, that don't always function according to our preferences

As I shared in years past and, again last Sunday, tese biblical images of God invite us to do three things:

- 1) To see **God** in new ways. We start noticing God in unexpected places or people. We start encountering God not just in church on Sundays, but in the ordinary "stuff" of daily life.
- 2) To see **ourselves** in new ways, as people made in God's image (Gen 1:26).
- 3) To see **our neighbors** in new ways. Rev. Dr. Lauren Winner claims that the attributes that we say belong to God are those we tend to value in the world around us. So if we picture God as king, for example, we're likely to give greater esteem to political leaders or wealthy rulers. But following this same logic, if we see God as an inmate on death row (Luke 23:13-25), for example, perhaps this might change the way we see our incarcerated neighbors. This is all to say that our spiritual imaginations make a difference. Exploring these different images of God shapes how we do "life together" on the ground.


