SERMON Birds of a Feather... Keith Williams

May the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts be pleasing to our God. I am pleased to have been asked to return to the pulpit, but it is difficult to follow Pastor Lee's preaching.

We've all likely heard this saying: "Birds of a feather flock together."

Today, I want to revisit that old aphorism.

Where I grew up in Wisconsin, those sayings were widely known, but I find that few of my current students have heard them.

I have also found that many don't know the word "aphorism". So every class also becomes an English and vocabulary class to increase our shared experiences.

Yes. My students pay tuition to learn words like "aphorism", along with clay techniques or art history. We strive in class to agree upon knowledge, and experiences. It helps to create a civil society.

I hate to be the guy who says, "Back in my day..." – but – Back in my day my culture had shared experiences. There were 4 television channels.

In school, we read classic European and American, mostly male, writers.

There was one rock/pop radio station - one country station and classical music was on public radio.

The selection of superheroes, and comic book characters was white. The black character Franklin was only introduced to the Peanuts strip in 1968 amid great controversy.

Everyone learned essentially one historical narrative: Chris Columbus discovered this. George Washington led that. Tom Jefferson wrote this. Tom Edison invented that. And, since I was born into the heart of the Cold War, we knew that MADAME Curie discovered radiation.

Also, everyone we knew was Christian. Mostly... but more on that later...

As birds of a feather, it was pretty easy to flock together, (unless someone routed for a team other than the Packers).

I am grateful for my childhood, there was much good, but I wouldn't return to those simpler times.

From my youth, I miss the great flocks of birds undulating across the sky in their dusk murmurations. Now there are many fewer songbirds in our lives.

I don't long for a return of those old cruel jokes deriding fat people, or Polacks, or women drivers.

But, I do miss the stunning quantity of butterflies and moths that used to fill my summers as I collected them. On summer night drives our windshield would be covered with bug juice. It was a mess, but when I drive those long drives now, there are very few of those lost, little guys. Our desire to eliminate bugs with pesticides is also eliminating diverse, abundant food sources for our birds and frogs...

Finally from before, I don't want the arts defined as just 'the Great Masters'. Now more people, <u>and more micro-cultures</u>, are able to express their ideas to us in a wide range of styles. The diversity is exhilarating to my profession.

I could go on listing what my village shared, but I really wanted to use that to examine the concept of "birds of a feather..."

Through a modern Christian lens, I struggle with the first half of this aphorism, because it reveals a very old way of thinking.

"Birds of a feather" recalls the 18th C. scientific practice of identifying and classifying. It was very appropriate during the age of discovery, or the scientific enlightenment. It even supported Christianity by suggesting that if God had created our home, and had asked us to be its steward, shouldn't we learn about it and wouldn't that then give us a better understanding of our loving Creator? Great concept. Science supporting faith.

But that scientific practice boils down to: how is this *different* from that? And if it's different enough it gets classified into another category. So, in biology we have the taxonomy order: Kingdom, Phylum, Class, Order, Family, Genus, Species. In geology, we have classifications of rocks depending on formation. Etc.

While this practice makes sense in the hard sciences, think of how much damage *defining the* world through difference can do when it spills over into human interactions...

We are Capitalists. You are Socialists. We're different.

This group is Straight. That group is Rainbow. DIFFERENT.

These believers are Christian. Those are Muslim, or Buddhist, or Sikh. DIFFERENT.

Conservative. Liberal. DIFFERENT.

White. Black. DIFFERENT.

What happens when we conclude that we are not birds of a feather? Should birds, perceived as having different feathers, flock apart? Should we only keep to our own? And then, what happens

when we discover more subtle differences in our own flocks? Do we separate out again, and form even smaller flocks?

Fortunately, today's Gospel gives us a very clear answer!

- <u>Matthew 10:40 "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the</u> one who sent me."
 - The emphatic message from Jesus is to ignore differences and to be actively welcoming.
- He illustrated this many times throughout his time on earth. In the parable of the Good Samaritan, and in his actual encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well, he held up **Samaritans** as worthy of God's gifts and capable of serving God.
- Samaritans worshipped the same God of Abraham as the Jews, but were reviled enemies of the Jews because they were **too** different. (Incidentally, modern Muslims and Christian worship that same God of Abraham.)
- The "huge" differences in *THE WAY* they worshipped God made these two groups implacable enemies. They couldn't even reconcile when invaded by a common enemy, the Romans, during Jesus' day. Their feathers just **seemed** too different.
- Enemies are enemies, after all Except to Jesus...
- In Jesus' heart, these groups both belonged to God could share in God's love and work and most important could equally receive God's gifts.
- Just a couple weeks back we spent time on Jesus' Great Commission. "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations..." All nations... All.
- All people and peoples share human limitations in understanding our God and creation. *Therefore*, all can receive the gift of forgiveness and the greatest grace we can ever know. No one faith earns it through worshipping the right way, or saying the right words, or doing good, while pointing out the wrongs of others.
- Instead, **God does the work** of loving and forgiving us in grace all of us created and accepted as God's **one** flock.
- We spend too much time discovering whether, or not, we are 'birds of a feather'.
- In truth, God has already answered that question for us. We are all of us 'birds of a feather'. We are all a part of God's kingdom. No further taxonomy is required.
- Whether Samaritan, or Jew, or Roman, or Muslim, or Christian, or Animist, we belong to God's flock. So then what could it mean to 'flock together'?
- Do you remember, I said that in my youth everyone shared a historical narrative, and were Christian? Well, not <u>everyone</u>: You see, there were two Native American families in my, otherwise, all white school district. They came from significant poverty, and they likely <u>didn't</u> agree on what Columbus did.
- For them, Columbus and the Europeans claimed the continents using foreign laws <u>and Christianity...</u>
 Jesus' Great Commission was wielded by these new people as an excuse to appropriate lands, (what a polite word), make slaves, and attempt to eliminate their own people's cultural practices and languages.
- Did you know that more First Nation people were enslaved in the Americas than imported Africans, in support colonial European economies?
- Those natives, in my school, weren't really treated as peers. My ancestors' flock valued conquering lands and extracting resources from it. Their ancestors literally valued the feathers that emerged from understanding how to live *with the land*.
- The natives came to class less and less, and didn't finish school with the rest of us.
- They were welcome in school. BUT, they weren't welcomed.
- Nobody wanted to hear THEIR history, THEIR stories, or see THEIR art. THEY didn't fit well in the shared narrative being presented in school. They weren't <u>welcomed</u> as part of OUR flock.
- To merely welcome others is a passive stance that has some virtue, but it also implies that the flock is already defined.
- To be **welcoming** is active. This recalls the active language of Micah who implores us not to simply wait for justice, but to "**do** justice".
- My Concordia students' schooling has encouraged them to actively welcome stories from across the world: to see art from across time, culture, and gender: to hear world music expressing cultures

other than their own. This lack of shared experience, and single-viewpoint narrative enhances their worldview.

I have no doubt that our congregation will actively welcome Ali Tranvik as our new pastor.

It is my hope and prayer that she helps us to become <u>actively welcoming</u> to the richly diverse community in which we find ourselves. I know that Cross of Glory still has the energy and heart to be an active agent of God's work.

You see,

Some flocks are like our Canadian Geese friends flying V-shaped overhead in loud, honking efficiency. As one lead goose tires - another takes her place to lead the group. All wing along, sharing the energy of the group for the long flight. The strong leader doesn't do all the work, but both helps - and - is - helped - in the task.

This is how I see the work of Cross of Glory with Pastor Ali flying into that lead position.

How I see God's true flock is more like a great murmuration of multi-feathered birds stretching across the landscape, flowing in cross-current directions – responding to God's differing impulses and motivations - all participating in God's gifts of forgiveness, and freedom in flight.
