SERMON

"COMING ALONGSIDE" John 14:15-21

People of God, grace and peace to you in the name of the risen Christ. Amen.

- Once again today, Cross of Glory Lutheran Church gathers for worship. Some are reading this sermon. Others of you are watching the service on the church's web site. Several of you are gathering around your computer at 9:30 a.m. on Sundays as we worship together by means of Zoom conversation. I'm thankful that we can still gather each week around God's Good News!
- Because of all the other news that we are hearing these days, it is good that we can hear God's news! As we continue to journey with the Covid-19 virus, have you at times found yourself feeling as overwhelmed and exhausted by the news lately as I have been? I want to be informed but sometimes the gravity and uncertainty of this pandemic can get pretty heavy. What I have found uplifting however, are stories of people reaching out and helping each other during this coronavirus. Let me share some stories that have given me hope lately.
- By day, Dr. Timothy Roach works in the M Health Fairview system screening patients for signs of the coronavirus. Because of his work with coronavirus patients, by night, he is in isolation listening for the sound of his children's voices through the wall. His son two-year-old Thomas knows his father is in the house, behind closed doors. "He understands that I am doing this to make other people's lives better," Roach says, "I told him that other people would do the same."
- And then there is Andrea Pien, a 33-year-old high school counselor. She is working remotely now that schools are closed. As a salaried worker, she doesn't expect to be missing paychecks. And so, she posted the following message on Nextdoor: "Hi neighbors, if you will be missing a paycheck, contract work, or if money is tight for food and supplies, message me and I will send you 20 dollars, no questions asked." She also included a picture of her very large dog, Gus! So far, she has given away about \$400 to her neighbors and anticipates more to come. Pien is a member of Resource Generation, an organization of young people who are committed to the equitable distribution of wealth, land, and power.
- And another story: In Ohio, someone recently went grocery shopping at an Aldi store. When they went to grab a shopping cart, surprise! Someone had put a quarter in every cart, twenty of them! And the kindness continued. Although shelves were quite empty, someone put the last loaf of bread in an elderly lady's cart, and another person let a father with two kids go to the front of the checkout line, which extended to the very back of the store. As one woman was paying for her groceries, she was short on money. The person behind her asked, "What do you need?" Before the woman could answer, the person gave the cashier a fifty-dollar bill and inquired if this would be enough.
- I'm not sharing these stories just because they're the kind of feel-good news I think we also need to hear at this time. I'm sharing these stories because they are stories of people reflecting the kind of love God calls us to show one another. These are stories about people who practice compassion and love for others, even when it is hard and costly for them.
- Today's gospel lesson opens with Jesus telling his disciples all he expects of them is that they embody the same kind of love he has modeled for them throughout his ministry. The fourteenth chapter of John begins a four-chapter section of his Gospel that scholars call the "Farewell Discourse." It

comes immediately after the Last Supper but before Jesus is arrested. It's a bit like the Last Lecture Series in some colleges, where professors are asked what they would say if they knew it was their last chance to speak. Here at the table, Jesus says the same thing over and over in different ways. The central word is LOVE.

"If you love me you will keep my commandments."

"A new commandment I give you, that you love one another

as I have loved you."

"Whoever does not love me does not keep my words."

"I am giving you these commands so that you may have

love for one another."

Jesus was calling his disciples, then and now, to live and love in ways that sometimes are not easy. Loving like Jesus, is certainly not something that we can do on our own. That's why Jesus says he will send the Spirit. The word John uses here for Spirit is *paracletos*- often translated "Advocate." It can have several meanings but overall, the most basic meaning of *paracletos* is to "come alongside another." Christ has promised to come along side us in the power and presence of the Holy Spirit, empowering us then to come alongside of others.

When you come along side someone:

-if they stumble your immediate response is to try to catch them

-if riding in a car and you brake suddenly, your immediate response is to put out your arm to hold them securely in the seat

-if you are walking along side someone and they begin to cry, you immediately ask what is wrong These are immediate responses because of the new spirit within us which makes us aware of those beside us!

This reminds me of one my favorite hymns by Daniel Iverson (Spirit of the Living God):

Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me.

Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me.

Melt me, mold me, fill me, use me.

Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me.

This is our prayer. To be God's vessels of love, not only holding it within us, but pouring it out for others to receive as we receive. I recently came across another verse of this hymn that continues the prayer saying:

Spirit of the living God, move among us all;

make us one in heart and mind, make us one in love:

humble, caring, selfless, sharing.

Spirit of the living God, fill our lives with love.

This is a great reminder of how we are to carry ourselves in love.

During this time, we witness the heroic acts of people who put their lives at risk to respond to the needs of others. We call them first responders. Their actions to come along side others is nothing short of amazing. Thank God for firefighters, paramedics, police officers and correction officers. Their actions as they walk along side and on behalf of other people are nothing short of amazing. Yet, truthfully, aren't we all first responders? Aren't we all called to be first responders, armed with kindness, compassion, empathy and love for others? As Mr. Rogers once said, "We live in world in which we need to share responsibility. It's easy to say, 'It's not my child, not my community, not my problem.' Then there are those who see the need and respond. I consider those people my heroes." Isn't that the truth? What we need in our world right now is not more division, fear, confusion, or self-centeredness. What we need are more and more people finding themselves in God's love and then reaching out in that love to others.

One last story: A six-year-old girl from Minnesota, Cameron Brundidge, has a brother, Brandon, who has crippling anxiety because of his autism diagnosis. Watching the news, Brandon would start to tense up with anxiety. What did Cameron do? She grabbed her brother's hands and started teaching him a Bible verse, 2 Timothy 1:7, to help him overcome his fear: "But God did not give me a spirit of fear, but a spirit of power, love and a sound mind." Cameron was a "paraclete" to her brother - she came alongside of him.

Might we, function as "paracletes" to each other by coming alongside of each other not only during times of crisis but always? Might we, in this way, become communities of the Spirit? Might we, in fact, recognize that in coming alongside each other we are loving Jesus most fully by conforming our lives to his and keeping his commandment above all commandments: Love God and love others!

Let us pray: Come, Holy Spirit, come. Tie us to Jesus and to one another that we may love one another even as Jesus has loved us. Amen.
