## SERMON Linging Chu

In today's gospel Jesus continued his teaching. This time, he didn't use parables, but spoke very clearly and directly to his disciples, saying "do not do as they do" because those scribes and Pharisees "do not practice what they teach."

As Jesus's time on earth came to the end, his teaching became more and more intense and direct. Like in Hebrew 4:12, it said God's words like "sharper than any two-edged sword," it came directly into the center of our hearts. Jesus started to tell his disciples to prepare, to prepare themselves when Jesus won't be there with them physically. He gave this warning to his disciples to follow Moses's teaching but not what those religious leaders and rulers did. Later on in Matthew 24 and 25, he spoke about the destruction of the temple and his lament for Jerusalem, he even talked about the sign of the final days, the second coming of Jesus, and the final Judgement. In only two to three chapters, he spoke so clearly about what his disciples would face and eventually what we will all face one day. When I think about this, I'm so amazed by how Jesus can put thousands of years into these short messages. Just as in 2 Peter 3:8, it said, "with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like

one day." For our eternal God, time is nothing. One of my favorite pastors once said "God doesn't need time, the reason God gives us time is to give us chance." That's so true! If God is eternal, why does he need time? He does not! The time is set here for us! To give us the chance to return, to praise Him, to proclaim the Gospel, to help those who are in need, to work for God, to walk along with God, and to be part of the glory in His kingdom. That's why He gave us time.

Now Jesus was using his last time on this earth to give his disciples some of the most significant teachings. Today's Gospel is one of them. Matthew 23:1 wrote "Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples." There is a very interesting detail, Jesus not only spoke this to his disciples, he also spoke this to the crowds. There are differences between the crowds and the disciples. Many times when the crowds followed Jesus, they had a longing heart for Jesus, they heard about him, heard about the miracles he did, so they wanted to see Jesus, they wanted to hear his voice, they wanted to see how Jesus look, and of course some of them wanted to see miracles happen in front of their eyes. Yet, there were only a few that decided to follow him. On the other hand, the disciples were the ones who have seen the same thing as the crowds, but took action and decided to carry their own cross and follow Jesus. This is the biggest difference between the crowds and the disciples. The message Jesus gave us today is the message that he gave to all: no matter whether you are Christian or not, no matter how long you have been a Christian in your life, it's for you, for all of us.

There are two very strong messages that spoke to me from today's Gospel and I hope this can also be a help for you too. The first is, take action. Let what we received from God become the true guide of our daily lives. If the Lord said "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." Then do it. Do it through our prayers, do it through our praise, do it through our daily devotion, and do it through the worship we are doing every Sunday. Every time when we come in front of God, we are truly praying with our whole hearts, we are truly praising him with all our souls, and we worship him with all our minds. The truth is that is not easy, this biggest commitment God gave us is not easy. To be honest, many times we won't love him with our whole heart until we encounter a situation that is way stronger than what we can deal with. We all of a sudden start to love God more, before that we always put ourselves first, and sometimes even after we went through the storm, the difficulties in our lives, we return back to where we were. There are so many examples in the Bible that showed the same pattern of how people go their own way and worship their own gods, and all the sudden they encountered something that is too strong for them to deal with, or too hard that they couldn't stand anymore, then they started to cry out to God. God would then take away the sufferings, but eventually people started to sin again.

Our old selves always wanted to put ourselves before God, and to tell you the truth, sometimes when I'm praying, my mind might be somewhere else, thinking about what I have to cook/eat for today, what are the things I need to do today and so forth. Therefore, this is not an easy commitment to make.

Jesus then said, "love your neighbors as yourselves." When it comes to this one, the actions become harder. Now it's not only God and me, but a whole lot of people on the list. How can I love someone who has harmed me before? How can I love someone who has disrespected me? How can I love someone who doesn't agree or has totally different views with me? How can I love this stranger that I have never met before?

When I was in college, my pastor gave us a challenge on how to love strangers. He asked us to pray for people wherever we go, pray for those who are around us that we don't know. I started to practice that, every time when I walk around the campus, I pray for every person I see. When I get on the bus, I would pray for everyone on the bus, I pray that everyone will one day know Jesus and they will be saved, and I pray for all the sickness of their body and mind will be healed. After a while, there was one time, the Spirit really moved me, and I started to cry. I suddenly felt how desperate God is. He wanted each of us to know Him and the fact He deeply loved all and was willing to sacrifice His only Son for us. I hope people didn't think I had some sort of a mental issue and randomly cried in public without any reason. But even now, I still can't stand firm in front of God and say I followed your commitment, because it's a lifelong

learning lesson for me.

The second message I received from today Gospel is the word "motivation." When we decide to follow God, are we ready to take on the actions on what he called us to do. Before we start, check your motivations. Here Jesus gave us a perfect example, those scribes and Pharisees not only don't practice what they teach, they refuse to take action. When they did take action, they did it with a wrong motivation. In verses 5-7 it said, "they do all their deeds to be seen by others; They love to have the place of honor at banquets and the best seats in the synagogues, and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces, and to have people call them rabbi." That is why they did what they did, just as Jesus knew exactly why those scribes and Pharisees did that. He knows our motivations too. Do we repent to God, or are we returning to God because we are afraid that we might lose his blessings and might lose what we have now? Or do we repent because we truly know that we have sinned against God. Are we doing what we do because we want to have attention and respect from others? Or do we do it because we know how much God loves us? What we are doing now can't even compare 1% with what he has done for us.

Today's other reading in the book of Micah, it gave us another example with bad motivation. When the prophet Micah spoke, he said "the prophets who lead my people astray, who cry "Peace" when they have something to eat, but declare war against those who put nothing into their mouths." Then he said "Its rulers give judgment for a bribe, its priests teach for a price, its prophets give oracles for money; yet they lean upon the Lord and say, 'Surely the Lord is with us! No harm shall come upon us." Those leaders and rulers were practicing injustice and prophesying the wrong messages for the purpose of food and money. As for those scribes and Pharisees, their motivation was based on reputation, power, being respected, and being honored. Those rulers that Micah mentioned show us another motivation, which is the satisfaction of their body and their greed for money. When we look for those motivations, those are all human nature. We need food, we need money in order to live a life on this earth, we want people to respect us, we want to have a good reputation, we sometimes want that power so that we are in control. All of those are things that come with the human body. But look what Jesus said about those things, he said "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." In Matthew 6, it says "You cannot serve God and wealth." In today's scripture, Jesus said "All who exalt themselves will be humbled, and all who humble themselves will be exalted." Jesus is so clear with all of those motivations, and he clearly told us what to do and what not to do. I'm not saying today you should start fasting or stop working, but the point is Jesus showed us here that once we start to be greedy with other motivations, that's when we will walk away from the path.

Last I want to end with Paul's letter here, he said to the Thessalonians church "As you know, we dealt with each one of you like a father with his children, urging and encouraging you and pleading that you lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory." Let us take action with pure motivations. Amen!
